APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

MOTION by Murphy, second by C.Gallagher to approve the minutes from June 10, 2013. **VOTE RESULTED:** *Approve:* Yes: C.Gallagher, K.Gallagher, Tanski, Murphy, Pucci, DeMarco. Abstain: Van Kirk. No: None. (***APPROVED***)

PUBLIC SESSION:

Earl Bloam of 4720 Forest Edge Dr. wanted to speak about Ord. 2013-46, relating to chickens. He said Brooklyn is not rural, or advantageous to having chickens, which can attract predators, and does not make a safe environment for the community's children. Asked how it would be enforced. Urges Council not to accept this.

Victor Ardito of 7439 Outlook Ave. brought up some suggestions for treelawn trees. Believes the city owns a tree stump and a bucket truck, and wondered the cost to do concrete work when the trees buckle the sidewalks. His mother had to replace sidewalk near her drive due to buckling, and now her driveway is buckling up, from the same tree. Asked if he could cut the tree down, and plant another one. Maybe a deal can be made with a tree company in slow times for removing so many at once, stump them, and set up a deal.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS & BOARDS:

Finance Committee (Councilwoman Pucci): The Committee met at 6:15 and recommended adoption of items on the Agenda related to finance; had an in-depth discussion on the splash pad, with bids that came in over budget, deciding to hold off for more information and a special meeting with the city engineer.

Economic Development Committee (Councilwoman Pucci): A meeting is scheduled for June 26th at 10:30 a.m.

Recreation Board (Councilman Tanski): The next Board meeting will be Monday, September 16th at 6:30 p.m. in the Mayor's Court.

Planning Commission (Councilwoman K. Gallagher): As of this point there is no Planning Commission meeting items, though Comm. Fitzgerald anticipates some applications coming in by Friday's deadline. If that happens the next meeting will be July 11th.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL:

Ron Van Kirk: Thanked everyone for being part of the meeting. Welcomed back Chief Mielke and congratulated him on finishing his training. Since last meeting received several phone calls and e-mails from residents, and thanked Dir. Verba, the Police and Fire Departments for their timely responses to those issues, also from those residents. Summer is here, encouraged hydration, and caution on the roads. Encouraged residents to contact Council for anything.

Colleen Gallagher: Told Mr. Bloam there are more than five residents raising chickens and roosters on their property, one of which has more than 25 chickens on less than an acre, which is not ok. She repeated again that a resident came to her to request permission to raise chickens. The law is not being enforced and that is wrong. So her goal for tonight was to address the ordinance and start enforcing it. She had researched it, and is asking President Pucci to table it because our former animal control officer just gave her a 1945 ordinance that "prohibited the keeping, maintaining, or harboring of pigeons, chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys, guinea hens, rabbits, mice, pigs, sheep, cows, horses, goats or any other birds, fowl, rodents or animals detrimental to the public health and general welfare on any parcel lot and subplot within the Village limits." So she will research it, as the Law Director or Clerk didn't let her know this ordinance was there. This proposed ordinance only allows two chickens per each one acre of parcel. Some say chickens attract predators and smell and carry bacteria and disease. It smells if their coops are not properly cleaned. The claim of carrying bacteria and disease, according to the Public Health Dept., are risks no different than a cat or a dog. Issues with predators or rodents is due to improper feed storage. Positives outweigh negatives: producing food, sharing, bringing a community together. She believes with these appropriate restrictions (no rooster, limit on number of chicken, proper coop size, permit, random checks) are a positive. Three Councilmembers gave their positions, and only one has commented on the raising of them illegally, which is a negative. So again she will table it, do further research, and get back to everyone in September.

Katie Gallagher: Told Dir. Verba a resident contacted her about trash laying in Marquardt Park, noticing signs that Brooklyn recycles, which was the trash laying around, but there are no recycle bins available. Asked if something could be placed there. Dir. Verba said he'll get something set up. She hopes everyone enjoys the summer.

Kevin Tanksi: Mentioned Ord. 2013-40, expanding the agreement with Zashin & Rich for additional \$25,000 for labor negotiations. Said Ord. 2012-64, for retaining Johnson, Miller & Schmitz to conduct labor negotiations was voted down by a majority. Then 2012-78 came authorizing retaining Zashin & Rich at not to exceed \$50,000 and approved by majority. The firm was changed to save tax dollars, not increase spending. Wants to know when the door will close on the high cost spending. Breaking it down, the city has spent \$27,697 for labor negotiations to date, most with the Ohio Patrolmen's Assoc. for \$16,225; \$3,206 for dispatchers; \$6,337 on Local 1099; \$8,017 on Firefighters IAFF; \$417 on AFSCME; \$3,493 on general costs. Nearly half of what was spent was on one department; and there are four departments to go, plus general costs. Where is the cap set? \$75,000-\$100,000 or higher? Suggested many times to use Federal mediation at no cost as an alternative and then move to fact finding if needed, which would have cost far less. He's asking Council to vote against Ord. 2013-40.

Tom Murphy: Thanked those who spoke. Asked for everyone to be careful on July 4th, and to have a nice summer.

Tony DeMarco: Reminded anyone interested in running for Brooklyn City Council that petitions are due by 4 p.m., August 7th. For questions, or anything he can help anyone with, he can be contacted at 216-741-0655. Regarding the 'keeping of chickens', he has made it known he feels we should not have chickens in the city. And if there is an ordinance currently on the books, suggests the Chief would have no problem enforcing that ordinance, and if he can't, we have a bigger problem. For the record, it seems the law firm hired to conduct negotiations for union contracts has done a fantastic job so far, and he will support the additional expenditure for their continued work.

Kathy Pucci: Offered condolences on the Eggars family on the passing of Rob Eggars. Welcomed back Chief Mielke, and said that we're proud of his accomplishment on being accepted into the FBI Academy. Asked Dir. Verba to answer during his report about a resident's call about a private company cutting treelawn trees, and give an explanation. Regarding the Ordinance to increase the law firm for negotiation's

threshold, Council doesn't like to spend money, and takes their oversight role seriously; but we need someone to represent us, and the general consensus is we are pleased, and also with their performance. She doesn't see another option, as you can't stop negotiating, and they've been hired to represent our interests. She understands the concern to spend more than initially estimated, but also sees that we don't have a choice. This is the last meeting prior to summer recess, though Council will schedule special meetings as necessary, one which will in the next few weeks for the bargaining agreement with the Police. Notices and postings will take place. Council also continues to address concerns and complaints from residents, with contact information on the city website, or from City Hall. Wishes everyone a safe summer. The next regular meeting will be Monday, September 9th.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Balbier: Land has begun to be cleared for Sheetz, with them expecting to be open by September. It's a \$3.1 million project, with the city getting \$26,000 in permits. There's a rain barrel workshop June 27th from 6-7:30. Register at 216-524-6580, ext 22. On the Agenda he is recommending Council approve Mr. Fitzgerald for Building Commissioner. He has 30 years experience with Lakewood, and has been the assistant here, and Acting Commissioner since Mr. Ockington left. The County's recycling report came in, with their average of 32.74%; Brooklyn at 39.43%. Announced there is a summer lunch program, from June 10 – Aug. 23rd, at 11212 Snow Road, for free lunches for ages two and 18 years; just show up and enjoy it. Children are fed first, then if there are parents they will feed them after the children. There is also a food pantry. There was a pre-construction for Ridge Road, which will start July 8th, starting on the west side of Ridge, at Memphis, with one-way traffic in each direction, with the first phase from Memphis to Hurricane Alley, ending November 15th. The second phase will continue to Ira; and the third in front of Ridge Park Square. On the Agenda there is approval for LA Fitness, and he has been receiving positive calls from businesses. They bought the property from Key Bank, it will be 45,000 sq. feet, and employ about 75 people. It's a plus for the city. He did receive an e-mail from Councilman DeMarco, stating he is against it, though he attacks him every week on economic development. LA Fitness is a perfect example, as a lot of developers come to him in private, not wanting the name of their company put out until it reaches the Planning Comm. stage. So he honors it, doesn't spread rumors, make second guesses, but waits for the Planning Comm. He and Fran are working on at least four other things, some huge, some small. But they can't be discussed, because the company doesn't want anything disclosed yet for various reasons (property not purchased yet, etc.) He is completely satisfied with the Economic Development Director. He hopes everyone votes for this tonight.

Councilman Murphy wanted to congratulate Chief Mielke on graduating from the FBI Academy, which places him in a very select category of officers of one-half of 1% of all officers in the world. This is a big deal, and he congratulated the Chief.

Mayor Balbier corrected a mistake on the rain barrel flyer – it will be held Thursday.

Councilman DeMarco responded to the comments about economic development. He's just asking simple questions, such as, how many jobs have we been directly responsible for creating in the last one, three and five years, and there is still no answer tonight. It's not a personal attack on our Econ. Dev. Director or the Mayor. The numbers are reality, and our payroll taxes are down significantly. Without the increase from 2009, we wouldn't be able to provide our residents services they expect. His point is, negotiations happen and can't be shared with Council, but he doesn't see enough activity around economic development, and he wants to see more, and thinks Council majority does also. He's trying to add resources to our economic development efforts, hoping to bring good paying, long-term jobs to the city. He asked again the Mayor send Council an e-mail about how many jobs the city has been directly for responsible in creating the last one, three or five years; or no answer.

DIRECTORS' REPORTS:

Service Dir. Verba: In response to President Pucci's question, relating to the Ridge Road reconstruction project, Perk Construction was authorized to take down the treelawn trees as they are directly involved with the construction and needed to be removed. President Pucci asked if they payment for it comes from the

construction project or does the city pay for it. Dir. Verba believes it comes from the county's part of the project. Said the Recreation Center was given a Trust by Edward Domino in the amount of \$77,000. The racquetball has been being renovated and turned into a cardiovascular room, which is near completion. It's hopeful it will be opened July 12th, which is the day that Mr. Domino passed. Information will be on the website and cable channel. President Pucci said she had previously said she'd like to see a plaque recognizing Mr. Domino's generous donation to the city. Dir. Verba said there is a plaque, which will read: 'In humble and grateful recognition, the City of Brooklyn extends its deepest gratitude to the Trust of Edward J. Domino, whose generosity has made this cardiovascular and upgraded workout room a reality. With sincere appreciation. Mr. Edward J. Domino, January 24, 1930 – July 12, 2010.' President Pucci thanked him for taking care of it.

Police Chief Mielke: Thanked Sgt. Knapp for standing in his place during his absence. Gave a quick update on CodeRED. The database is being populated, and hopefully up and running in the next month or two. Information will be put out through the Sun News and the city's website. They will test call and get it up and running.

REQUESTS:

Request from Mayor Balbier for confirmation on his appointment of Edward Fitzgerald as full-time Building Commissioner, effective July 1. Mr. Fitzgerald has been Acting Comm. for six months. As requested by Councilwoman K.Gallagher, the Mayor reported his salary is \$72,000. **MOTION** by C.Gallagher, second by Tanski to confirm the Mayor's appointment. **VOTE RESULTED:** *Confirm appointment:* Yes: VanKirk, C.Gallagher, K.Gallagher, Tanski, Murphy, DeMarco, Pucci. President Pucci congratulated Comm. Fitzgerald, and said Council is pleased with his attitude, the changes he's made so far, and his cooperation with Council.

Request for Council Confirmation for LA Fitness, SW corner 140/Tiedeman Rd. (between Max & Irma's and Key Bank), PP#433-09-007. The Planning Commission at its June 6th mtg. granted Conditional Use approval from Visconsi Companies, LTD for an LA Fitness Center. It was determined to be a Conditional Use, which requires majority confirmation by City Council.

Brad Goldberg, Vice President of Development for Visconsi Companies was present as the prospective purchaser of the land with Key Bank and will be the landlord to and developer of the proposed LA Fitness Center. He made himself available for questions. Councilman DeMarco asked total construction costs are and roughly the annual payroll. Mr. Goldberg replied that construction will be around \$8 million. It's still being decided if it will be a 24 hour club; but two shifts with minimum 15 people per shift, but he does not have that payroll info. Councilman DeMarco asked he provide the info to Fran or the Mayor to be forwarded to Council. Councilman Van Kirk asked the timetable. Mr. Goldberg said this will be the flagship location (they purchased Urban Active in Crocker Park and Legacy), hoping to break ground in the fall, starting construction as soon as they can get permits, hoping to open next summer. Councilwoman C.Gallagher asked what will be included, besides the pool. It's a 45,000 sq. ft. building on four acres with state of the art cardio equip, therapy list, pool, training, spa, babysitting services; a high end health club. Council President Pucci asked what had been targeted for this particular lot, as a preliminary approved site plan years ago showed a mix of office, retail and hotel. Mr. Goldberg said the master plan from awhile ago was a plan for more development, but the owner of the land pulled back because they want to bring more jobs from downtown to this location. Initially this piece was planned for a hotel, but there was never a user or a deal, so it never happened. That's why this is a Conditional Use request because of how it was initially planned. He did not know what plans are for the other lots, only that they want to bring more jobs there and build it up, a main reason they want to go there because of highway access and visibility. Council President Pucci said she shares some same concerns Councilman DeMarco had expressed in an e-mail about the limited space available to bring in high paying jobs and to diversify our tax base. She did research and knows this is a top notch organization, and with hotel versus this fitness facility, she will be supporting this. Mr. Goldberg said these additional jobs that would be coming to the city is in turn a magnet for them to come here. **MOTION** by Murphy, second by K.Gallagher to approve the Conditional Use request. **VOTE RESULTED:** *To Approve:* Yes: VanKirk, C.Gallagher, K.Gallagher, Tanski, Murphy, Pucci. Request from Fire Chief Zemek for permission to dispose of old and outdated breathing apparatus (SCBA), in service pre-1999. A FEMA/AFG grant was awarded to purchase the new units. CCC's Fire Training Academy is interested in taking some of the SCBAs for non-firefighting/training evolutions. He also wants permission to donate some to the Academy. **MOTION** by Van Kirk, second by K.Gallagher to authorize the disposal and donation. **VOTE RESULTED: To Authorize:** Yes: VanKirk, C.Gallagher, K.Gallagher, Tanski, Murphy, Pucci, DeMarco. Request for authorization for park rehab project as submitted by Game Time for \$79,798.24, done in conjunction with US Communities Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchase Agreement. The amount was approved at the last meeting, but the wrong contractor was presented, which is now corrected from David Williams and Assoc., Inc. to Game Time. **MOTION** by Van Kirk, second by C.Gallagher to authorize the correction. **VOTE RESULTED: To Authorize:** Yes: VanKirk, C.Gallagher, K.Gallagher, Tanski, Murphy, Pucci, DeMarco. Request for authorization for roof work over the old fire station, recommended by Service Dir. Verba for \$2,600 for Terek Roofing, Inc. for repairs/patchwork. Council approved on 3/25/13 accepting a bid from the Garland Company/Design Build Solutions (Master Intergovernmental Cooperating Purchase Agreement and the U.S. Communities) for a proposal from Terek Roofing for the City Hall roof project not to exceed \$350,000. This is from Jan, 2013 when FEMA declared a Disaster Declaration for damages and ancillary costs incurred in the aftermath of the Oct, 2012 storm Hurricane Sandy. Other payments will be forthcoming for wage reimbursements.
